

A LITTLE ABOUT DANVILLE LIGHT OPERA

Five years ago a small group of Danville residents met at First Presbyterian Church to discuss the possibilities of forming a non-professional organization to fill what they felt was a gap in the community's cultural life between high school and professional musical productions.

They saw a need for an outlet for townspeople who possessed singing abilities

that had gone unused after high school or college graduation.

From the meeting came the idea for organization of the Danville Light Opera Company — dedicated to the production of musical comedies and operettas.

It was a small beginning and Franz Lehar's "Merry Widow" was selected for

the first show at Schlarman High School April 12-13, 1956.

Danville area residents accepted that first show and today the Danville Light Opera Company has emerged as a full-fledged member of the community's cultural life.

Growing attendance prompted the group's move last year to the larger auditorium at Danville High School.

Growth also has enabled the organization to plan this year for fulfillment of another goal set at its establishment—that of providing monetary grants to both Danville and county high school graduates who wish to pursue the study of music.

The Danville Light Opera Company is chartered by the State of Illinois as a not-for-profit corporation. Its Board of Directors and officers receive no pay-nor do technical directors for productions or members of casts and stage crews.

Payment of royalties to publishing firms and composers for permission to perform musical shows accounts for one-third the budget set for each production. Rental fees for eight weeks of rehearsals, use of the stage for performance nights, costume and scenery construction costs consume the remainder. Many costumes are donated, while others are sewed by volunteers. Painting of scenery is all volunteer work.

For the first time this year, it has been possible to earmark additional funds for establishment of music scholarship grants.

The organization has done its utmost to select shows over the past six seasons that have given audiences a wide variety of the best in musical comedies and operettas.

"The Merry Widow" was followed by "No, No Nanette," "Connecticut Yankee," "Brigadoon," "New Moon," "Show Boat," "Naughty Marietta," "Oklahoma,"

"Of Thee I Sing," "South Pacific" and "Red Mill."

Richard Telling, now of Danville, Ind., was the first president of the Danville Light Opera Company. He was succeeded by Russell Suycott as interim general manager. Suycott's untimely death was followed by the election of Dr. Jack Baldwin, now of Hoopeston, as president. Roy H. Goranson Jr., Frank M. Williams and Dr. Robert J. Westwater also have been presidents of the organization. Goranson is now serving his second term at the helm.

Last year, for the first time, the group was asked to perform outside of Danville. It gave both "South Pacific" and "Red Mill" at Hoopeston under sponsorship of the Rotary Club there for the Hoopeston Community Memorial Hospital fund.

The Danville Light Opera Company was asked again this year—and "Annie Get Your Gun" was produced there this fall in a special benefit performance.

The organization has endeavored to be of service to civic groups by providing singers for luncheons and other programs.

It has been singled out for recognition of community service in several instances. On Labor Day of this year, it was awarded the first place trophy for

its float in the National Sweet Corn Festival parade at Hoopeston.

The people of the Danville area have voted their acceptance of the organization—and the organization hopes that its continued growth may enable it to

maintain a vital role in the community.
